Message from Pastor James

This month brings in the beginning of Lent. That somber time of the Church vear when we reflect on Jesus' march toward Jerusalem to His death. Of course we know that His death was not the end, it was the beginning. The beginning of the time we call the New Testament. Under this New Testament or New Contract we are saved by Jesus, the Christ, who was the final one time perfect sacrifice for all sin. The introduction to Lent begins with Shrove Tuesday. In older traditions it was the last day you could eat meat, fatty foods or sugar ladened sweets and syrups before the Lenten time of fasting from such victuals.

The word 'shrove' is an ancient English word that means 'absolution.' This was the day when Christians would traditionally go to church, for private confession and absolution, in preparation for the somber season of Lent. In the French language "Fat Tuesday" is pronounced "Mardi Gras" which is the name of the celebration, generally associated with New Orleans, Louisiana, that occurs at that time. Fat Tuesday being the last day one could eat meat, fat or sweets, and why that day has become a day of binge eating and partying rather than the day of repentance it was originally meant to be.

Shrove Tuesday is followed by Ash Wednesday. This is the first day of Lent. It falls 40 days before Easter. Traditionally this day was marked with a somber service including the "Imposition of Ashes" on the forehead. The palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebration were brought in. The pastor would burn them and use the ashes to mark the foreheads of the members with the sign of the cross. This ancient tradition began because in

much of the biblical era it was the custom to cover one's self with ashes as a sign of repentance or sorrow.

People looking very close at their calendar might notice there are actually 46 days from Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday. The reason we say there are 40 days is that we do not count Sundays. Every Sunday is a celebration of Easter and is therefore not part of the season of Lent. The Christian Church worships on Sunday because it was on Sunday that Jesus came out of the tomb. It was on Sunday that Jesus met with His disciples after He rose. It was Sunday that the Holy Spirit descended with a great wind and tongues of fire. So our Sunday worship services are a brief respite from the sorrows of Lent to remember Messiah has come and His name is Jesus. Alleluia! He is risen!

I would encourage all of you to use our mid-week services and the Easter season to invite friends and neighbors and even long lost members of our church family to come. The sermons, like Advent and Christmas, will be shorter in length and very purposeful and direct messages of sins affect and God's salvation through Jesus Christ our Lord, and the joy we all have in that knowledge.

God's blessings to all of you during this Lent and Easter season.

Stewardship Thought of the Month (TOM)

"I am not commanding you, but I want to test the sincerity of your love by comparing it with the earnestness of others. For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:8-9).



Thought of the Month

Without commands or even arm-twisting, St. Paul encourages, even challenges, the Church in Corinth to demonstrate the sincerity of their faith by their generosity in giving. He does this because giving generously is a gift of the Spirit given to us through the Gospel.

St. Paul wrote: "But just as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us—see that you also excel in this grace of giving" (2 Corinthians 8:7). In other words, just as we grow in faith and speech and knowledge of eternal things by the Holy Spirit through the Word of God, so also do we grow in giving from the same Spirit through the same Word.

The problem is that the grace of generosity often grows cold in us. It's not so much that we stop giving, but we don't put it first. We treat it like all the other bills that must be paid. It becomes a chore, just one more thing to check off a list of things to do. That empties it of its spiritual power and robs us of the joy that Christ and the Scriptures assign to it.

On top of that, since this generosity is linked to faith and knowledge of divine things, a lack of excelling in giving is a sure sign that our faith and knowledge of God are under attack as well.

Thus St. Paul points to the foundation of generosity: the generosity of Christ Himself. Even though He was rich, He became poor so that we who are poor might become rich. Thus, the incarnation, suffering, and death of our Lord on the cross is the reason, source, and driving force for our generosity in giving to the church.

And since Christ who was rich became poor so that we might be rich in His grace—of which generous giving is part—so we also who are rich in His grace can excel in pressing His grace into service toward the gracious work of the church.

Pay attention to what you give to the church so that you may excel at it. And if you find that your heart has grown cold or indifferent toward it, immerse yourself in God's Word. Read it at home. Attend Bible Class. Hear and listen to it preached in the Divine Service.

Be reminded of what Christ has done for you in His incarnation, suffering, and death. For this will strengthen your faith and knowledge. And where that excels, so will the grace of giving excel also.

The January 9, 2018, meeting was called to order by President Vance Oelkers at 7:01 p.m.

OPENING DEVOTION: Pastor Groleau

SECRETARY'S REPORT: M/S/P to accept the secretary's report for December 12, 2017, as corrected.

<u>TREASURER'S REPORT</u>: Net Operating Income: \$36,005.82. Net Decrease in Designated Assets: (\$34,870.28). M/S/P to accept the Treasurer's report, as written.

ELDERS' REPORT: Pastor could use some help with shut-in calls and Pastor Bailey is agreeable to help with that. M/S/P to utilize Pastor Bailey to make shut-in calls to be paid per call plus mileage. It will involve approximately 2 to 3 days per month to be worked out with Pastor James. M/S/P to grant a request to release Teri Watkins from membership. February 4th is Boy Scout Sunday. We as sponsors of Boy Scout Troop 113 will invite the troop and their families to worship with us and possibly help hand out bulletins and Pastor will recognize them. Communion and distribution of ashes will be included in the Ash Wednesday service on February 14th. In anticipation of the closing of Holy Cross Church, their members would like to get to know Pastor James and asked if he would preach and lead bible class a couple of Sundays in the near future. We would like them to feel welcomed to join us once their doors are closed so Pastor James will contact them to make arrangements. The Elders decided to provide the supper before the Lenten service on March 21st.

<u>TRUSTEES' REPORT</u>: The normal monthly bills have been paid. We are having problems with one of the boilers and it needs to be replaced and may be under warranty. Christmas decorations have been taken down. A small dormer will be built above the east entry, when weather permits, to divert water away from the door to keep ice from forming on the sidewalk.

BOARD OF EDUCATION: The Sunday School Christmas program and birthday party for Jesus went good. The next meeting will be on Tuesday, January 16.

STEWARDSHIP BOARD: The Scrip gift card distribution schedule is set for January. The "Thought of the Month" stewardship message in the monthly newsletter continues.

YOUTH & FAMILY BOARD: No January meeting was held. We have a youth event planned for Sunday, January 28th to make Valentine cards for the shut-ins. M/S/P to donate/provide muffins once a month for the Youth for Christ get together for a cost of \$36.00 to come out of the Youth balance.

SOCIAL MINISTRY: No report.

EVANGELISM: They have not met yet in January. They will serve for the March 14 Lenten supper.

Worship Services: Saturday & Sunday, Advent, Christmas & New Year; Funerals: 1 for Arlene Borchard; Other: 12/14 Meeting at Holy Cross to discuss mission ministry opportunities; Planning to show "The First Rosa" on 2/11/17 at 5:00 p.m.; 2/11/17 St John's will host the Circuit Forum at 4:00 p.m. to elect a Circuit Visitor and elect delegates for the District Convention; Lent and Easter planning: planning a Shrove Tuesday, may plan for a Maundy Thursday Seder and planning a Saturday Vigil; Starting to meet with kids at Youth for Christ; Vacation and Conference February 19-25. Beginning to explore preschool/daycare, using a model developed in previous parish. There is a great need for this in Austin and it can be a good tool for outreach, but there are many hurdles to get started. Met with Asian African Emigrant Services to discuss how we can help them assimilate emigrants into our culture and the Austin community. Many of the leaders of those various cultures are seeking specifically Christian place to help with that here in Austin.

OLD BUSINESS: We are still waiting for the sample padded chairs to come in because they are backordered.

<u>NEW BUSINESS</u>: Board Lenten suppers schedule: Social Ministry on February 14, Board of Education on February 21, Stewardship and Youth on February 28, Trustees on March 7, Evangelism on March 14, Elders on March 21.
