Message from Pastor James

Here are some numbers that should trouble you:

- Only half of all children who are Baptized will be Confirmed.
- Only half of all Confirmed remain in the Church past the age of 21.
- Only half of those who remain after age 21 will pass that onto their children. (In the very successful congregations. Generally it is less.)

What are we to do?!

It's no secret that reaching out outside of our church walls is important. I thought I share some additional information on that subject. The first thing we need to know is: what are people looking for? What they seek might not be what we want to give, but knowing what they seek may help us better speak to them about that they need. People are often looking for a brief escape, an hour of peace on Sunday morning. What people need is the eternal peace found in Jesus but if we can't provide what they're looking for (an hour of peace and escape) we'll never get the opportunity to provide the eternal peace we know they need.

Understanding that, we then need to see people in two categories because they are really only two. The first is missionaries. The second is those who need missionaries. If you are a Mark 16:16 Christian you are a missionary. The number of missionaries (true believers) in our culture often seems do be dropping. That means the people who need missionaries is growing.

I recently heard a gentleman explain the Christian Church in America as a place, in the past, where culturally nearly everyone went, and now is probably more likely a place where only believers go. His point was the Church is now populated by more truly faithful and less who are putting on a show. This shows us that Cultural Christianity is fading. Only the "real Christians" go to church. So the "Church" must leave the building.

People will not 'just show up' and get 'Christian-ized' any more. We must "evangelize them" not just "sacramental-ize them." What I mean by that is this. In the "good 'ol days" people just came to church. They got their kids baptized, confirmed and married. Evangelism was done primarily at the Baptism font and the constant hearing of God's Word taught each Sunday. The problem now is they don't, and won't, come every Sunday. Many won't have their children Baptized "unless grandma just won't let it go" so they'll put on the show, for grandma. People will not 'just show up' any more.

Evangelism is no longer done within the church walls. It must be getting out into the community. Evangelism is education. It is introducing people to a person. That person is Jesus. Evangelism is foster an environment of invitation, hospitality and listening. It is no longer simply Word and Sacrament. (It probably never really was.) It is sharing the Gospel, the Good News.

So knowing what people want is the first step in giving them what we know they need. What do people say is the most important thing they want in church? "Don't judge me." The biggest fear people hold about going to church is being judged: "Where have you been so long?" "What kind of Christian do you think you are?" "You should..." "You better..." "You need to learn to follow the rules." There are probably churches like that, but they are dying and it should be clear why.

(Now I need to interject here this does not mean doctrine does not matter. It does matter and it is absolutely important. We should believe what we say we believe. I am also not saying we should not teach it. But old: policies, procedures and regulations, old traditions and 'we've always done it that way' may be extra things we've added to the faith. Everything we do needs to be evaluated according to Scripture. If it's not in the Bible, and it keeps people away from the church, it needs to endure some scrutiny to determine if it is truly helping do the work of the Church.)

When it come to outreach many people feel intimidated. There is a fear of failure. "What if I say the wrong thing?" "What if I offend someone?" "What if I offer to help and mess it all up because I don't know how?" To overcome that fear of failure we need to overcome Satan's lies. It is not our job to connive, scheme or plot with 'bait & switch' tactics and stunts to trick people into coming to church. We're not selling a broken down used car. We're selling Jesus! (Of course 'selling' is not a good word here.)

We are offering the Best of the best. The King of kings. The Lord of lords. Eternal peace to replace a moment of peace. In that context all the pressure is off of you. Put it where it belongs, on God's shoulders. It is the Holy Spirit who will call them by the Gospel out of darkness into His marvelous light. (1 Peter 2:9)

Real success then is not measured in the number of people who come, because you and I cannot control how many people come. Real success should be measured by the number of conversations I have and relationship I build, because I can control that. In that light everything we do in church should be about conversations and relationships. Every function we have at church should be geared not to bring the community into the church. They should designed with the idea of bring the church into the community. If we are active in the community we have permission to speak. If we are not active in the community they will see us pontificating platitude that we don't really believe.

We must also loose the panic that a shrinking church sometimes feels. We need to grow from "Please stay!" to "Please go!" What could I mean by that? Three words: **desperation, invitation, multiplication.**

"Please stay!" – Is an active of desperation. It means we'll take anyone just to have good numbers. We won't care what they believe or how they act. We just want to have a good head count so we'll tolerate anything as long as they'll claim they are Christian.

- "Please come!" Is the next step. It is an **invitation** to come and share the peace that surpasses all understanding. *(Philippians 4:7)* It is to join the community around us and contribute to it as we share where we get our peace and what drives us to help. Here we loose the platitudes and share our peace, the Prince of Peace.
- "Please go!" This is our goal, but don't misunderstand! We're not kicking people out! This is **multiplication**. It is when we help grow a new congregation that can develop and prosper. Large churches have genuine struggles when it comes to offering personal care. The better model is a number of small gatherings, each one focused on a particular aspect of the greater community.

All of this all begins with prayer. Psalm 78 is a good one:

Open your ears to My teachings, My people. Turn your ears to the words from My mouth. I will open My mouth to illustrate points.

I will explain what has been hidden long ago, things that we have heard and known about, things that our parents have told us. We will not hide them from our children. We will tell the next generation about the LORD's power and great deeds and the miraculous things He has done.


Psalm 78:1-4

Reading/Praying Challenge:

Prayer is so important and it is to often forgotten. I'd like to challenge you. I would challenge you to pray all 150 Psalms, one per day, beginning on September 30th. Some of them are long, particularly Psalm 119. I'd suggest breaking the long ones up into two or three little pauses throughout your day.

Beginning on September 30th will take you all the way to Ash Wednesday, when I'll have another challenge for you that will take you right into Easter.

"The Gospel we are called to share is simple, but our world is complex."

Ain't that the truth?

The Rev. Dr. Mark Wood, director of LCMS Witness & Outreach Ministry, quoted above, knows that it "takes effort to learn how to share the simple Gospel in the various contexts of our complex world."

Thankfully, a new program in the LCMS called *Every One His Witness*[™] (E1HW) aims to guide that effort and pave the way for faithful Lutherans to bring the message of Christ to their neighbors naturally, through their various vocations. According to Wood, "E1HW seeks to restore evangelism to its proper place as the most important — and the most joyful — work that we do in service to Christ and to our neighbors."

As part of the development of E1HW, several LCMS churches had the chance to test-drive the program while learning how to reach out organically to those God has placed around them. Hope Lutheran Church in St. Louis was among those churches. The congregation hosted a daylong training seminar for E1HW in April 2017.

"The program ... is based squarely on the Scriptures and consistent with our Lutheran focus on salvation by God's grace alone and witnessing based on our vocations in all of life," said the Rev. Randy Asburry, pastor of Hope. "The stories told in E1HW help people to see that bearing witness to Jesus is not a science or a proven methodology. Rather, we get to see how the Holy Spirit works through His Word in the real lives of people."

Bringing Christ into the conversation, into the "real lives of people," is exactly what E1HW zeroes in on, mainly through what the program calls the LASSIE approach: "Listen, Ask, Seek, Share, Invite and Encourage."

"The LASSIE approach is so helpful because it does not present a canned script of what to say to people. [It] educate[s] and remind[s] us that God's good gifts — His Word, my reason and all my senses — equip us to speak of Jesus to family, friends, neighbors and co-workers in an engaging and winsome manner," said Bob Myers, a member at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Pensacola, Fla., which also piloted the program. "E1HW reminded me that listening is an important skill to develop, and that every individual has a different and compelling story for us to listen to, and that every individual is one for whom Christ died and is one who needs to hear the Good News of salvation in Jesus Christ alone."

<u>SECRETARY'S REPORT</u>: M/S/P to accept the secretary's report for October 9, 2019, as written.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Net Operating Loss: \$(8,686.94). Net Increase in Designated Assets: \$3,414.12. M/S/P to accept the Treasurer's report, as written.

ELDERS' REPORT:

Pastor reported the Fall Schedule has started. He is working with Pastor Olana for a combined Confirmation program. Pastor will be attending a Missions Conference in Minneapolis the week of September 23-27.

Communion Setup, Communion Assistants and Prayer Elder schedules were set.

Old Business - the Elders will continue with a single Communion Assistant.

New Business -

Discussed moving the Saturday Service to Thursday or Wednesday. Will continue on Saturday until additional congregation input can be gathered.

Personnel committee to be established to conduct a Pastors review. Elders: Nathan Wradislavsky, Tim Carlson and Dave Watkins will review the district pastor job description and meet with Pastor James in October.

Clergy appreciation month is October.

Release of Membership from the Nathan and Jennifer Augustine family to St John, Lewiston MN (WELS)

October Elders Meeting to be held on Monday, October 7 at 6:00 p.m. The meeting is moving to the first Monday for October <u>only</u> to meet ahead of the October Council meeting on Tuesday, October 8.

TRUSTEES' REPORT:

Preparations are being made in advance of insulating the attics over the offices, choir room, library, youth room and class rooms. Upon inspection of conduit in the attic a serious deficiency has been discovered. The conduit connecting each of the lights in the three corridors was insufficiently supported when originally installed and as a result most conduit connectors have been broken which exposes the electric wires to potential damage. This

situation has come about from inadvertently stepping on the conduit hidden under the insulation over the years and was discovered when one of the wires shorted out. This needs to be corrected before more insulation is blown into the attic. Vance Oelkers is securing pricing from licensed electricians to correct this unsafe condition. The lower of two bids for insulation is from Unruh Insulation from Stacyville, IA. Their price of \$9,440 was approved by the Trustees to recommend to the Council. Installing the insulation would be scheduled after the conduit situation has been corrected and necessary communication wires have been installed in the attic for the Chapel.

The dormer over the East door will likely be constructed and ceiling repair made in September as well as installation of a second attic access on the west side.

In light of Pastor pursuing the purchase of another home, Trustees recommend to Council that, if that occurs, the parsonage be sold once it is empty.

David and Parker Bracken were hired to trim the bushes around the church and the two signs.

Required annual inspection of our water backflow preventer was performed and a report to the city was made by Harty Mechanical, and is now scheduled to be performed by them each August.

The pew project has been completed.

BOARD OF EDUCATION:

Rally Day was a great success. 60-75 meals consisting of hamburgers, hotdogs, chips, vegetable salad, pie and drinks were served. Because of rain, the bouncy house was moved into the fellowship hall. The kids LOVED it; it over-shadowed the other games.

Plans are being worked on by Kerri Groleau and Lisa Flerlage for the Harvest Festival.

STEWARDSHIP BOARD:

Carol and Pastor John Schleicher led the board members through its own identification of God-given Spiritual Redemptive Gifts. The members identified their own gifts of Proclaiming, Giving, Encouraging, and Teaching; and now, in co-ordination with Pastor James, plan to lead a Spiritual Gift identification for each of the congregational members. It is planned for Harvest Sunday, November 17, during the bible study time after the church service. Hopefully, the result of Spiritual Gift identification will be empowerment, confidence, and joy to serve, since God has done this gifting.

We decided not to use the stewardship program package offered by KLW Enterprises.

Script card sales continues. We may expand the program.

The board still needs one more member.

YOUTH & FAMILY BOARD:

The Youth and Family Board met with the Board of Education for first time to work collaboratively and support each other in board efforts. At this meeting we discussed Rally Day which will take place on Sunday, September 8th. There will be lunch, games and prizes after the education hour. The members of the Youth and Family Board will be available to assist with Rally Day. The Youth and Family Board shared that we are planning to do a fundraiser this fall. The fundraiser involves the youth selling wreaths following worship services in September/October. The Pastor shared that he will be meeting with Sunday school teachers regarding the new curriculum and schedule on Tuesday, September 3rd at 5:30. The next meeting will be held Tuesday, September 3rd at 4:30 p.m. Ellen Petersen and Sue Downey will attend this meeting to discuss the Hallelujah Harvest Festival. Tuesday, September 3rd, 4:30 p.m. Ellen Petersen and Sue Downey presented information regarding the Hallelujah Harvest Festival. Ellen left the binder with game descriptions, numbers, donation information and timelines with Lisa Flerlage. Many thanks to Ellen and Sue for all their past years of volunteering for this event. Signup sheets for volunteers will be put up on the bulletin boards this Sunday. Rally Day was also discussed and details were worked out regarding this event. Rally Day will take place Sunday, September 8th following the education hour from 11:30-2:00. Representatives from these 2 congregations will come to our next coat drive meeting. Thrivent Funds of \$250 have been applied which will be used to purchase new children's coats. Posters have been distributed to some of the area churches asking for coat donations. A box has been placed in the east entry for coat donations.

PASTOR'S REPORT:

A great deal of work was put into the implementation of a new cross generational program of worship and education this summer.

I am attending a number of conferences, and continuing education functions, and they will continue through September.

A number of new initiatives will be started over about six months beginning in October. They include:

It was decided how to disperse Thrivent income starting 2020: half to St. Johns LWML and half to St. Johns operating budget.
