Message from Pastor James

What is Advent?

Advent is perhaps one of the most misunderstood seasons in the Church Year. We meet it every year and yet every year it seems like the world around us rolls straight through from Thanksgiving to Christmas. There is no waiting, we move straight to the joy and the celebration.

Of course this makes sense. Christmas songs, movies and traditions can bring light and cheer to our lives. Christmas is about the arrival of God among us, it is about celebration, hope, and joy. Advent is about waiting. One of those certainly sounds a lot more fun than the other, but Advent is what grounds Christmas in reality. The truth is at many times in our lives we are waiting. We are waiting for hope in a world that often feels full of uncertainty. We are waiting for love in places where we carry hurt and shame. We are waiting for our world to reflect God's dreams, for it to be a place of safety, freedom, peace, and justice for all.

Advent meets us where we are in the darkness and in the waiting, and reminds us that waiting is not a barrier to God. It reminds us that God acts in the waiting, in the mist of the mess and the broken. It reminds us that we do not look for a big, triumphant flash and flood of light that will neatly tie all our problems with a bow. We look for the little signs of love and peace, we look for the tiny baby born, a sign that at first glance looks like nothing out of the ordinary but is

truly an extraordinary sign of God's love for us.

In the book: "Home for Christmas: Tales of Hope and Second Chances," author Gregory Boyle writes, "Advent is about trading in the vindictive, disapproving god for the God who loves us without measure and without regret. This God does not share in the demonizing in which we all engage. Advent is about allowing ourselves the time to be reached by the tenderness of God and then reflecting that tenderness in the world."

This Advent we wait once again. Waiting can be a kind of holy slowing down. It's a way of seeing how we yearn for tenderness, for the kind of love that truly is unconditional. It's a way of seeing the ways we miss the mark, slowing down in our thoughts long enough to catch the judgments we often make without noticing. It's a way of slowing down so that we can practice that tenderness with those around us.

How can you engage in this time of pause, of holy slow down, in a season that is so busy? Maybe by inviting someone who might be lonely over for dinner or coffee. Maybe by taking the time to notice the need for God in the faces of those you walk past in the store. Maybe that looks like taking a few minutes each

morning to pause and reset with God before facing the day.

When we take the time to slow down and wait, we begin to see the extraordinary in our everyday mundane, the signs that what we celebrate at Christmas is still true today: God's tender love is here with each of us in each and every moment of our lives.

Praying the Psalms

Back in September many of us started praying through the Psalms, one each day. Are you still praying them? I'd encourage you to continue. You'll notice that many of them speak of the enemy's attacks and lies. That is what Satan does, which is why he's called Satan. 'Satan' is a Hebrew word that means 'accuser.' He speaks lies before God, and in our ears, trying to tear us down. The Psalms speak of a Savior, our God, who will vindicate us and destroy the enemy. As we end the old Church Year we are reminded that Judgment Day will come for him, but as we start a new Church Year we are reminded that his demise comes because a Baby came, a Baby named Jesus our Defender, our Shield, and our sure defense. The Psalms are deep prayers. Prayers for this moment in our lives and for the deeper richer meaning with eternal ramifications. I pray your prayers fill you with that peace.

Advent and Christmas

There are two times a year when invitations to church are easy:
Easter and Christmas. With
Christmas nearly upon us consider inviting people to our services. Our
Advent services will explore,
"What Child is This?" Who is

Jesus? Why did He come? Who am I to Him? What does He bring?

Our Sunday services will look at the ancient prophecies and promises, some nearly as old as Creation itself, and how they are fulfilled in wonder, power, strength and might, of Jesus Christ alone. We teach the children the Christmas message every year, then we also ask them to tell it back to us. The children's Christmas program will be that time when the young among us will take center-stage and learn to tell the Good New of Jesus to others. Sharing the wonder of salvation found in the love of God delivered by a Baby.

Helping Children understand the True Meaning of Christmas

Have you ever heard of a Jesse Tree? A Jesse Tree is a way to help children understand the true meaning of Christmas. Jesse Trees are a very old Christmas tradition that first started in medieval times. They are used to help tell the record of the Bible from Creation to Christmas throughout the Advent season.

The name comes from Jesse who was the Father of the king David. In the book of Isaiah it says, "A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse: from his roots a Branch will bear fruit. The Spirit of the LORD will rest on him. The Spirit of wisdom and of understanding, the Spirit of counsel and of power, the Spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the LORD, and he will delight in the fear of the LORD. He will not judge by what he sees with his eyes, or decide by what he hears with his ears; but with righteousness he will judge the needy, with justice he will give

decisions for the poor of the earth." *Isaiah 11:1-4*

A 'shoot' is a sign of new life and new beginnings. Jesus was, as a human, a descendant of king David and as Christians we know and believe that Jesus is this new 'shoot from the stump of Jesse.'

The first Jesse trees were large carvings, tapestries or even stained glass windows put in Churches, but now Jesse Trees are used as an Advent Calendar. Each day through Advent a special decoration or ornament is hung on the tree to tell the record of God's salvation that is fulfilled in Jesus.

We will have ornaments available for families to take home, along with a little book that can be read to the children each day. This can be a great way help children see past the commercial Christmas to the real meaning: Jesus.

Outreach

The POBLO initiative. What is POBLO? (poblo.org) It stands for People Of the Book Lutheran Outreach. POLO's primary focus, when it started, was reaching out to people lost in Islam, the Muslim religion. There are very very few practicing Muslims in Austin, so why bring POBLO here? POBLO brings a great deal of skills, experience and expertise in reaching the lost for Jesus. Those skills can be used, as they are elsewhere, to

bring anyone to the truth of salvation found only in Jesus.

The skills I want to hone and improve here at St. John's are in just that place. Our goal as a church should be reaching outside of our walls, outside of our comfort zone, to see the lost as those to whom we need to bring the love of Jesus. That should be our primary focus in all we do here. We are surrounded by so many who are walking in the darkness. Isaiah 9:2 states, "The people who walk in darkness will see a great light. The light will shine on those who live in the land of death's shadow."

That light comes in the Gospel of Jesus. The Gospel is shared through God's Word along the avenue of relationships. Simple skills like hospitality, kindness and patience will do much to bring that message to others. POBLO can do much to teach us how to reach our lost neighbors and friends, and help us see the fruition of real growth in the Church.

True Church growth is not found in counting people and counting money. We'd all like to see our pews and offering plates more full, but how they are filled is important. If the new people are simply those who have moved from another church to ours then The Church has not grown. We love our new members we are glad you are here and pray all we do here will be a blessing to you. However The Church grows when people are brought from the darkness into the light; when those who are outside of the Christian faith and outside of The Church come to that place where the small flicker of faith is fanned into flames foundationed on Holy Scripture.

I want St. John's, working along side Holy Cross and Our Savior congregations, to experience the awesome wonder that is found in the lost coming to faith. To see those infants in the faith (regardless of age) coming to the Font and in the waters of Holy Baptism become children of God. This is something that should be celebrated as it enlivens and bolsters our desire to see it all the more. Those who come should be welcomed and cared for as we help feed and strengthen that faith.

If we as a congregation are doing that, then we as a congregation are fulfilling Jesus' Great Commission, "Wherever you go, make disciples of all nations: Baptize them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and teach them to do everything I have commanded you."

I pray this new 2020 Church Year, beginning with the holiday (Holy Day) season, will deepen in you the desperate desire to see this happening all the more. I pray that this congregation will grow, feeding off of the love of God poured out, in water, on those lost souls. Souls, now no longer lost, being cared for and welcomed into our congregation as fellow faithful followers of Jesus who will lead us all safely home.

POBLO is the first of three initiatives I have planned for this 2020 Church Year to help us in doing just these things. May God grant us the wisdom and desire to do this well.

I'll explain the others UpWorks, and Ongoing Ambassadors for Christ, later.



The 12 Days of Christmas: Unwrapping the Gifts

If you, like good king Wenceslaus, looked out on the Feast of Stephen—that's Dec. 26, for the record—you might think Christmas is over. On the Christmas Day evening news, local TV stations are already posting Christmas tree pick-up sites and times. Some trees hang around for a week to give a festive atmosphere to New Year's Eve and Day, then come down. On Jan. 2, Valentine's Day candy is in the stores.

That fits with the world's Christmas season, but the Church has something a little different going on. December is largely taken up with Advent. The idea is preparation, but not in buying presents and food. It's about a preparation of repentance for celebrating the coming of God in the flesh, Jesus, who will die to save us from our sins.

Christmas Isn't Just One Day

The Church's celebration of Christmas does not begin with December and end on Christmas, with New Year's Day tacked on the end. In the Western Church, it begins on Christmas and continues until Epiphany. That day—Jan. 6—is when we celebrate the arrival of the Magi to worship Jesus. By tradition, these twelve days from Christmas through Epiphany comprise the Twelve Days of Christmas.

How did that happen? Nobody knows. Epiphany is a much older feast than Christmas, but it's largely forgotten by most, lost in the shuffle by many, and celebrated by a few. Now how did *that* happen?

The Original Christmas

By the late fourth century, Epiphany was celebrated on Jan. 6. The earliest known reference dates from 361, and in those days the references indicate not just the appearance of the kings—*epiphany* is an English form of a Greek word meaning "appearance" or "manifestation"—but also the appearance or manifestation, the epiphany, of God, including His birth.

It's not that there wasn't Christmas. This is Christmas as well as a celebration of all the other events in the life of the young Jesus up to and including His Baptism and first public miracle at the wedding in Cana. In short, it's a big day.

Developments in the Western Church

In the Western Church, events began to spin off from Epiphany. By the sixth century, Dec. 25 had become the celebration of Christ's birth. His Baptism was celebrated after Epiphany, so Epiphany itself focused on the arrival of the kings who, not being Jews, give it the significance of the appearance, or manifestation, of the Messiah to the Gentiles. Divisions cease. Jesus appeared not only as the Chosen One of Israel but the Lord of all nations.

Developments in the Eastern Church

The same doesn't hold for the Eastern Church, where the day retained its original character. Many adopted Dec. 25 as the feast of Christ's birth but kept the celebration of His Baptism on Epiphany. There's the added complication that Jan. 6 in the older, Julian calendar (still used liturgically by the Eastern Church) is the equivalent of Jan. 19 in the Gregorian calendar used in the West. Confusing!

In the Eastern Church, the day is more commonly called the Theophany—the divine appearance or divine manifestation—and is considered the third most important feast in the church's calendar (Easter is first and Pentecost second). So, while there aren't Twelve Days of Christmas for our brethren in the Eastern Church, Theophany is more in line with the original intent of what we in the West call Epiphany.

And Then Came Vatican II

To complicate matters further, after a millennium and a half of usage, Rome decided at its last council, Vatican II in the early 1960s, to make Epiphany a movable feast. Now it's no longer on Jan. 6 but on the Sunday after the first Saturday in January. So, if you were to listen to Rome, there aren't Twelve Days of Christmas in the West now either!

But for us Lutherans—those who seek to hold to the catholic (not Catholic), evangelical faith—we can look to our latest hymnal, *Lutheran Service Book*, and find that Epiphany is still happily listed as Jan. 6.

What Is Feast of Stephen?

"Good King Wenceslaus looked out on the Feast of Stephen." Now, if you think Epiphany got lost in the shuffle, what about this Feast of Stephen? It's Dec. 26, the day after Christmas.

Stephen is the first recorded martyr for the Christian faith. It is the custom of the Church to commemorate someone not on the day of his earthly birth but the day of his birth to eternal life (his death). So it only makes sense that the first person to have been born to eternal life by martyrdom for his faith is celebrated right after the earthly birth of Him who came to make eternal life available to us.

Who Is This Wenceslaus?

Wenceslaus was a martyr for the Christian faith just like the first one, Stephen, on whose feast he looked out (according to his legend, at least). He served as the duke of Bohemia, now part of the Czech Republic, in the early 900s. He's called good because, despite his pagan mother, he kept the Christian faith of his grandmother, St. Ludmilla, who was herself converted by saints Cyril and Methodius, the "Apostles to the Slavs." He was, according to tradition, a pious and prayerful Christian leader, killed at the hands of his pagan, power-hungry brother.

So what was Wenceslaus doing looking out on the Feast of Stephen? Tradition says that he spotted a man scrounging for food and asked his page where the man lived. In mercy, he then set out with his page to bring the man and his family aid. The page started faltering due to the cold and snow, but when he followed in Wenceslaus's footsteps, he is said to have found the ground warm to his feet.

How to Celebrate the Twelve Days of Christmas

You can still follow in the good king's footsteps. John Mason Neale's carol says, "Therefore, Christian men, be sure, wealth or rank possessing, Ye who now will bless the poor, shall yourselves find blessing."

That means that from Christmas Day onward, all the fun and festivities are just beginning! You have twelve more days to celebrate, so leave those decorations up, right on up through Twelfth Night (Jan. 5–6). Also, check with your pastor. Many churches have a special service each day of the Twelve Days of Christmas to commemorate Christ's Incarnation—His coming to earth in the flesh—for your salvation.

Simply put, the appearance or manifestation of God is just too big to contain in one day! That's why the Church doesn't. Instead, it extends the celebration of God's coming among us to twelve days, starting at Christmas. Don't let the world, the mall, or any calendar tell you any differently!


