Message from Pastor James

Coming out of COVID, and the news reports often making us wonder if we're going back to masks and social distancing, what can we do? I think there are three schools of thought on this.

- Our church is fine. We just need to get back to normal. Then we'll be fine.
- 2) Out society has permanently changed. We need to strengthen our efforts in the work we've been doing. We need to get members to step up, volunteer, and get our church active again.
- 3) Culture has permanently changed. Recruiting volunteers is a failed plan. We need to learn a new way to lead people to Jesus and to disciple them where they live, work and play. We need to live lives of demonstrating the Gospel Good News.

What is the answer? The answer can be found in 2 Kings 7. The prophet Elisha speak words, of hope for the future, to a hopeless Israel. Israel is under constant attack and threat by the Arameans {ar-ME-ans}. Things are not good. People are starving, physically and spiritually. The city is closed. Nobody gets in. Nobody gets out.

The scene then changes to a conversation between 4 men suffering from leprosy. Who are evanluating the situation. They surmise:

- 1) If we do nothing. We die
- 2) If we go into the city, where it is safe. We die.
- 3) If we go to the enemy camp of the Arameans. maybe we die. Maybe we live.

They make decisions around scenario 3. They choose to do something new and different. It requires risk, courage and a willingness to accept that failure is possible, but not the only possible outcome. Stepping out in faith they discovered God was already there and God had acted before they arrived. The enemy armies had also heard of impending doom, and without God's presence in their hearts, they had run for their lives.

The 4 lepers eat, drink and celebrate. Then they go back and share the Good News What was the response to their words? Some were cautious. Some said, "Don't listen to them. Death waits for us!" Their skepticism was overrun. Seeing a future with a chance (even if it was a small chance) ran to a fresh lease on life. God was present before the knew He was there. God had acted. The lepers' made decisions around scenario 3, desperate as it might have appeared, was centered around the possibility, "Maybe we'll live."

In my work in churches during, and before becoming a pastor, I've spoken to, and learned from, many wise and seasoned missionaries and pastors who have brought the Gospel to people outside the Christian Church; to people who have never set foot in a church and

neither had their parents before them. In all those conversations there is one consistent message that has risen to the top.

When you want to do the Church's work, look for where the Holy Spirit is already working. Go there!

There are plenty of skeptics. There are plenty of people who are afraid of a future that includes change. What if we die?! What if our church dies?

- 1) If we do nothing. We die
- 2) If we go into the church, where it is safe. We die.
- 3) If we go to the enemy camp, the evil world that surrounds this building, maybe we die. Maybe we live. Let's look at those three scenarios a little more closely.
- 1) If we do nothing. We die. If we just keep waiting, if we just wait out the mess of the world, we are waiting to die. If we give up on church, give up on teaching our children the Christian faith, if we give up on the people living in darkness, there is no hope. That's why the Bible, in leading up to the "Great Faith Chapter," charges us with these words:

"Let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, all the more ... [Hebrews 10:24-25]"

Matthew 4:16 says, "The people dwelling in darkness have seen a great light, and for those dwelling in the region and shadow of death, on them a light has dawned." For those who do nothing. That light is hidden and they are hiding that light from others. The answer to this scenario is so simple, and we all know it.

This little Gospel light of mine I'm gonna' let it shine.

Hide it under a bushel. No!
I'm gonna' let it shine.

We are the "Light bearers." We carry the light of Christ. What will we do with it? One answer is to do nothing. If we do nothing we can expect nothing.

2) If we go into the church, where it is safe. We die. If we just keep waiting, and coming to church for only ourselves; if we just wait out the mess of the world, we are waiting to die. The church cannot grow unless the work Jesus gave us to do is done. Jesus said, GO!

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, Baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit... [Matthew 28:19]"

The view the world has of the Church is bad! We are no longer an "assumed good." the Church is seen as the enemy that needs to be silenced and purged from the world. American society sees the Church as a burden and a problem. The old answer, "our doors are open come in for a visit" will not work. No one will come. If we hide inside they will never find us. Our cultures belief that the Church is the problem is a message that has been repeated often. It is a lie! But a lie told often enough will appear as the truth. That is the power of gossip. It breeds death. Death to those outside the Church, and death to the Church.

3) If we go to the enemy camp, the evil world that surrounds this building, maybe we die. Maybe we live.

We have an awesome, powerful, and profoundly unique message! It is the Gospel of Jesus Christ! We are the "Light bearers" to the world and to our neighbors. After those words about "a Light has dawned…" it reads, "Jesus began to preach, saying, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.' [Mathew 4:17]" Doing nothing is sin. We say so every week:

Most merciful God, we confess that we are by nature sinful and unclean. We have sinned against You in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and <u>by</u> what we have left undone...

The same holds true for coming to church, but only for ourselves. If we "hoard church" for ourselves; if we fail to share it we are not listening to Jesus who saved us. He said GO! The questions are: Where do we go? What do we do? How to we know?

One of the most powerful ministries a Church can have is a youth ministry that reaches outside the Church.

When you want to do the Church's work, look for where the Holy Spirit is already working. Go there!

Jesus, calling a child to Him, said, "Truly, I say to you, unless you turn and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. [Matthew 18:2-3]"

Jesus said: "Let the little children come to me and do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of heaven. [Matthew 19:14]"

One of the most powerful ministries a Church can have is a youth ministry that reaches outside the Church. Parents will follow their children into a church. If the children learn to love the church, enjoy the church, and learn about having a very real relationship with Jesus the parents will follow.

How many of you when you first got married allowed the Church to slip by the wayside, but when the kids were born returned to the Church, for the kids? How many of you have seen that in others? The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod was filled with members. We all remember the times when we set up extra chairs. Evangelism was done primarily at the Baptism Font.

At that time that is how we used to do things. That time is gone.

Today parents are not coming back to church with their children. Our society, in repeating the lie that "the Church is the problem," has convinced most people that the Church is the problem. People will not come. They will not come until we convince them the Church has the answers. The Church, and the faith in Jesus we teach here, is the answer. It is the only answer.

Coming out of COVID, and the news reports often making us wonder if we're going back to masks and social distancing, what can we do?

As we get back to "normal" let's not get back to what was normal. Let's start a new "normal." the mission of St. John's is excellent in its brevity and wisdom: P.E.W.S.

Let us go forth in peace. to **P**roclaim God's Word. **E**ncourage one another in faith. **B**earing Witness to God's love. **S**erve all people.

In the name of the Lord.

As we start up with new boards and a new school year, I would ask each board to really think about how their board can fit their work into that mission. It is God's mission. It is the Church's mission. It should be our only mission.

Bible Study Encouraged

As we start up with new boards and a new school year, I would ask everyone to strongly consider getting into Bible study. The preliminary report from Ambassadors of Reconciliation included an observation of a lack of Bible study. The Bible needs to be the focus and central piece of everything we do. We'll get a list of available studies out soon.

Additionally I would ask each board to consider following the example the Pastor and Elders have set. Take 10-15 minutes, at the beginning of each meeting, looking into God's Word. The problem is often in finding something to study. We all get, through the generosity of this congregation, a copy of the Lutheran Witness. There is a brief Bible study in there each month. I would encourage you to start each meeting with that study. Look at what God's Word says, then get about the business of the church, which can only be done when God's Word is the focus.

Please pray about this and allow the Holy Spirit to work, through God's Word, to lead in Jesus' name. Pastor James.

What is a Confessional Lutheran? Part 2

In part 1 of this series, I briefly outlined what is meant by the term "Confessional Lutheran." In fact, from the time of the Reformation, to be Lutheran meant to be confessional. Being "Lutheran" meant that one subscribed to the Confessions of the Lutheran Church.

In more recent times the strong connection between being Lutheran and a subscription to the Lutheran Confessions has been weakened, maybe even lost, by many. To some, the Lutheran Confessions are just historical documents, about a past time in our history. For others, the Confessions are studied in the seminary but then never read or looked at again. If we no longer know or define ourselves according to the Lutheran Confessions, what does it mean to be Lutheran? The answer is: nothing.

Let me give you an example. Many people study and learn a foreign language. The problem is the time comes when the classes are done and the time to use the language passes. After a few years if I were to ask to converse in that language, most probably could not? Why? Because they did not continue to use and study the language, and as time went by they lost that knowledge.

That is most certainly true with me personally with Japanese. I wanted to travel there, so I learned the language. I walked around the country, often in very small towns. I went for nearly a week with almost no English being heard, or even spoken by me. Today I remember almost nothing of that language, aside from a few phrases.

The same is true of the Lutheran Confessions. We can learn the Confessions and what they say and mean. Part of those Confessions include the Small Catechism which most of you spent much time studying. Yet if we do not continue to read, study and apply it throughout our lives, how can we truthfully and faithfully live, or teach, the pure doctrine contained in them to those who follow after us? How can we remember what it means to be Lutheran? How can we continue to subscribe to what our Confessions say?

This is where some of the differences and divisions in our Synod come. We have lost our Confessional knowledge which bound us together, and are instead relying on something else. That can be precarious and unreliable ground. To be a Lutheran is to subscribe to the Lutheran Confessions as the correct exposition, or explanation, of the Word of God. To do this we must know what they say. Otherwise the false teaching of others will creep into our churches and our theology until there is no longer a Lutheran Church. It means something to be Lutheran. Luther said it time and time again, we must know "What does this mean!"

Beginning in August I am going to restart a tradition I had at my previous congregation. It is to take a few Sundays each Summer to dig into the Confessions. We will do that primarily through the Small Catechism, because that is probably the most accessible part of the for the congregation. We will being on August 1 looking at the First Commandment, and work our way through all of them each week that follows.

I will have copies of the Small Catechism available for those who do not have, or cannot find, one at home.

May God bless us in our work in His kingdom.

Sudanese Ministry Spotlight

August, 2021

It is an honor for me, Rev. Gatluk Reat, to share more about the ministry to Sudanese people in Southern Minnesota this month. Perhaps you are wondering why there came to be so many Sudanese people in this area.

Religious, economic and cultural differences within the country of Sudan led to a decades-long civil war. Finally, in 2011, it was decided that the best way to end the fighting was to split the country in two. The northern half of the country remained the country of Sudan and the southern half of the country became the country of South Sudan.



The years of war caused millions of Sudanese people to flee the country and take refuge in refugee camps in Ethiopia and Kenya. You may have heard or read about the Lost Boys of Sudan as several books and movies have been created to tell their remarkable story. I was not one of the Lost Boys of Sudan but my family was one of the millions of families that fled from our war-torn country and ended up in a refugee camp in Ethiopia.

While living in the Ethiopian refugee camp I started going to church which led me to being baptized at the age of 12.

Coming to America was not my plan; it clearly was God's. His almighty hand guided and protected me the entire journey. An organization called Church World Service sponsored me to come to the US. I ended up in the Twin Cities where I was able to finish High School and start college.

When some of my Sudanese friends relocated to Faribault and started attending Trinity Lutheran Church, Faribault I joined them and became a member of Trinity in 1999.

Since coming to America 25 years ago I have been able to return to Africa many times. In a future newsletter I will share with you the exciting mission work that is happening in the region of Africa from which I came.

I ask for your continued prayers for my ministry among the three communities of Sudanese people I serve, Faribault, Austin/Albert Lea and the Twin Cities. Ask our Lord Jesus to open hearts and ears for the continued

growth and work of His Kingdom where His seed has been planted. Do not allow the evil one to come and snatch away what has been sown in hearts. I would love to bring the Good News so all who hear can indeed bear fruit and yield a harvest in the communities I am called to serve.
