The 1st Commandment

The truth is it is far easier to count 9, 12, or 14 commandments in Exodus 20. It is actually hard to come up with a way to number them as one through ten.

The first three commandments are about our relationship with God.
The last seven are about our relationship with other people.

There are three functions of God's Law. What are they?

_____ It keeps us on the right path. It prevents us from driving off the road.

_____ It shows us ourselves. It shows us what we are doing that is wrong?

_____ It tells us what road to take. It gives us directions to get safely home.

This is the first commandment God gave, so perhaps He felt it was the most important. Why do you think this commandment is the most important?

What kind of relationship does God want to have with you?

What are some things that people make more important than God?
More important than coming to church or reading their Bible?

If a person puts other things as being more important than God, what will happen to them when they die? Where will they go? Heaven or Hell

Can a person claim to be a true believer and not be?

Look at 1 Kings 3:12. What does it say about Solomon?

Read 1 Kings 11:4-7. What happened to Solomon?

Here's the scary part. The Bible never says Solomon returned to the true faith. If that is true where did Solomon go when he died? Heaven or Hell

Look up these verses: Proverbs 1:7 and Proverb 9:10.
What do these verses tell us?

So why are we here studying these things?

Let's read the 1st commandment together.

You shall have no other gods.

What should “fear” mean to someone who does not believe in God?
