Lesson 22 – The 8th Commandment

You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

(Exodus 20:16; Deuteronomy 5:20)

This commandment covers far more than just questions in a courtroom. This commandment includes any negative talk about a person without speaking to them personally. It is about spreading information about people, even if it is true, that would hurt them or harm their reputation. It goes even further then just teaching us not to do such things, it also teaches us that we should help those around us to protect and preserve their reputation. We should say good things about people. Things that will cause others to respect and appreciate them.

It is wholly inadequate to the government of any other."
